

VISION

The Circle of Life shows that everything is connected to everything else. As human beings, this is true as well. Our physical well-being is related to our emotional, spiritual and mental well-being. If something is wrong in one area, it affects all the others. It follows; therefore, that development in any one area must be balanced and connected with efforts in other areas.

Who are we and why are we on this earth? We turn to the Creator to guide us, to give us the answer to what path we will take. The Circle Project is a spiritually based organization that uses traditional Indigenous culture and teachings as a framework within which to offer programs and services to all who request help.

PHILOSOPHY

Our approach to the social problems faced by many in our community is a holistic one. A person must develop mentally, emotionally, physically and spiritually. Therefore, we offer a variety of programs designed to help an individual overcome challenges, become physically healthier, regain pride, build self-esteem and grow spiritually.

The Circle Project offers self-development programs and services within a cultural framework that has proven comfortable and acceptable for Indigenous people. Any person who desires assistance is welcome. Traditional people have been a fundamental part of our organization from the beginning and they provide guidance to us generally, as well as work with individuals who need their help.

MANDATE

Today's Circle Project Assoc. Inc. is an urban based, Indigenous organization that provides programs and services in Regina and surrounding areas. Although our program participants are both Indigenous and non-Indigenous, our main focus is working with Indigenous people in a community based setting. The Council (Board of Directors) maintains an Indigenous majority as part of the mandate.

Programs and services are delivered through an integrated program model, which was developed by the Circle Project in 1997. The linkage of programs creates a network of services, which serve as stepping stones for vulnerable individuals and families as they work toward independence and sustainability.

The Circle Project, a non-profit charity, has been operating since 1988 and has been supported by federal, provincial and municipal governments, corporations, businesses and the community.

This year was like no other, for us as individuals, our organization and the community. With the continued onslaught of the impacts from the worldwide pandemic we, along with so many others, struggled at times to find or create our own new normal. Relying on the wisdom of our founding Elder Louis Whiteman who said "do the right thing for the right reason and a way will always be made for Circle Project", we moved forward in faith. And now we know that a way was truly made. In a few short months we will be moving to our new home at the Hub and we can hardly wait to be closer to the community we serve. The new Circle Project Community and Cultural Hub will be there to help fill the current gap in services in the area and build new opportunities in and with the community for many years to come.

All of the staff did an incredible job throughout the year, in spite of the enormous challenges we faced, proving once again that they truly are the backbone of the organization. With broken hearts we said goodbye to our long-time colleague, co-worker and dear friend, Allan Pratt who will always remain an important part of Circle Project and will stay in our hearts in the days and years ahead. We saw some retirements this year and we welcomed new staff as we continued to manage what seemed like a year of continuous change. The Council, steadfast in their commitment to serving the community, found new ways of working together to overcome the challenges of trying to promote the creation of the Hub and raise much needed funds in the midst of a pandemic.

Thank you to our program participants, membership and the community for giving us the privilege of providing service and support this year. To our funders, supporters, sponsors we couldn't have made it through this very difficult year without your support and encouragement. And last but not least to the very special people that are at the core of our organization, our Council and staff. Your efforts, diligence and perseverance was what helped us get through the difficulties of this extraordinarily challenging year. FAMILY VIOLENCE

Thank you to the Victims Services Branch - Ministry of Justice

Since 1998, the Circle Project's Family Violence program has been actively participating in leading the way to prevention and intervention of violence in the community.

The Anger Resolution Techniques (ART) is a twenty hour program that runs over nine weeks. Participants register, then must participate in the two – 1 hour prerequisite orientations, prior to participating in the 2 hour, once a week program. The ART program assists in developing techniques to help individuals identify anger that can lead to outbursts or aggressive behaviours that could lead to violent situations. Participants are guided to develop ways to control these emotions.

This program year, there were 114 registered participants in the Family Violence program. Of those who attended the ART program, 91% completed. A total of 64 modules were delivered in house and an additional 28 make up modules were provided to those participants that had an occasional missed module due to other commitments or illness.

This has been the most challenging year that the Family Violence program has faced since it began over 20 years ago, marked by the passing of our friend and co-worker, Allan Pratt, and the COVID-19 pandemic. We are very thankful that we have been able to continue to facilitate groups this year and provide individuals the opportunity to learn a healthier way of living. In spite of the challenges we faced, we were able to expand the Family Violence program through the development of a new and exciting program called "Bringing Peace to Relationships". This new program will be tested with females referred through Regina Domestic Violence Court (RDVC) in 2021.

The Circle Project staff is a part of a networking group in the RDVC. In this court people charged of domestic assault and domestic related offences and who accept responsibility for their offences have the option to participate in the Domestic Violence Treatment Option (DVTO). This can lead to a lighter sentence for those who successfully complete the program. In 2020/21 the Family Violence program had 12 females referred from the RDVC and 67% of these participants successfully completed the ART program.

It has been an honour to be a part of the Circle Project staff that continues to provide leadership in our community. I would also like to thank the funders, community partners, agencies, Circle Project Elders, Council and Staff for its ongoing support throughout the year; it has been a blessing especially this year.

BUILDING CULTURAL COMPETENCY

Thank you to the City of Regina - Innovations Grant & Regina Work Prep

The Building Cultural Competency (BCC) program is an educational based learning opportunity that engages both Indigenous and non-Indigenous communities to start making connections between Canada's history and reconciliation. This is accomplished through presentations and activities that create learning opportunities. Doing this, we begin to understand the true meaning of reconciliation and the positive impact it can have on our community. Reconciliation promotes healing. Once we begin to heal as a community, we can begin to bridge the gap and move towards unity, together.

The BCC program was developed to provide assistance and support to individuals as they build or rebuild a connection to the Indigenous culture. The program serves to assist individuals in regaining self-identity, building a sense of belonging, reducing social isolation and reconnecting with the community.

New this year was our work in the Youth on Their Way to Work (YOWW) program. This program provides cultural assistance and support to individuals through a formal community partnership. Our goal is to engage participants in cultural understanding based on traditional teachings for Indigenous and non-Indigenous youth ages 18 to 30 years old. Participants can utilize traditional teachings to increase opportunities for inclusiveness, education and cultural experiences all contributing to a higher self-esteem level, cultural identity and spirituality.

This year 80% (24/30) of participants successfully completed the program. The remaining six participants discontinued due to securing employment or moving to other programming. For the six modules in the program, the participants visited Circle Project for the first and last modules. The remaining four modules were held at Regina Work Prep.

The students had access to our program Elder Margret Rockthunder for the opening and closing talking circles hosted at Circle Project. A total of 51.5 hours of program service were delivered in year one. We are excited to work with the YOWW program for the next 2 years through our community partnership agreement with Regina Work Prep.

We look forward to new opportunities in the 2021/2022 year to share culture awareness and reconciliation as we bridge the gaps in our community through building cultural understanding.

Thank you to Ann Perry, our Executive Director for your guidance with this important program. Because of your continued support we have been able to provide opportunities for Indigenous and non-Indigenous youth to increase their cultural knowledge and understanding.

CHILDREN'S CENTRE

Thank you to the Ministry of Education – Early Learning and Child Care Service Delivery and REACH

Licensed by the Ministry of Education, Early Learning Child Care Branch the Circle Project Children's Centre, located at 1115 Pasqua St., is one of a very few Indigenous childcare centres in the city of Regina. We provide quality childcare for the community we serve, focusing on early childhood education for children ages 6 weeks to 5 years old.

This was our first official year of providing infant care at this location. The transition flowed very well as all the staff and families adjusted to this change. The newly converted infant space provides a soothing environment that has its own defined areas for sleeping, playing, changing and eating. The educators provide quality care based on each child's individual age and stage of development. This helps them achieve milestones that are right for each child at their own pace. An important part of the infant program is the exposure to Indigenous culture from a very early age.

Our toddler and preschool programs are play based and provide culturally relevant and age appropriate programming designed to promote healthy and holistic development for each child physically, emotionally, mentally and spiritually. We also provide the Cultural Connections for Kids program (see page 8) which is designed for children ages 3 and up.

In March 2020 we, along with the world, were faced with the COVID-19 pandemic and the many barriers and challenges that came along with it. Extensive measures were put in place for the safety of our children, families and staff at the centre. Our enrollment decreased considerably and we were faced with many changes as the pandemic restrictions constantly shifted. In spite of everything I am very thankful we were able to keep all our staff employed throughout the year.

It was another great year with the staff, children and the families. I would like to extend my thanks to all the staff; everyone worked well as a team and were all hands in with the many changes that occurred throughout the year. To their credit, the staff did not allow this to negatively impact their daily programming and quality of care provided for the children.

Thank you to the Circle Project's Board of Directors as this year was challenging for everyone. A special thank you to Ann Perry, our Executive Director. The ongoing and extra support you provided our centre is always greatly appreciated, especially this year.

INFANT & TODDLER CENTRE

Thank you to the Ministry of Education – Early Learning and Child Care Service Delivery and REACH

The Infant and Toddler Centre located at 4401 Dewdney provides quality childcare and is licensed by the Ministry of Education, Early Learning Child Care Branch for children aged 6 weeks to 4 years old.

When you enter our Infant and Toddler Centre you walk into a home like environment that has natural lighting and spaces designed for younger children. Programming is based on the age and developmental stage of each of the children, who are mostly Infant and Toddlers. We have two separate yards allowing more than one group to go outside at a time and enjoy the outdoors.

The Centre has had many upgrades in the past couple of years. These range from the redesigned outdoor play space, to a newly renovated infant area. The newest upgrade is one that has been high on our wish list for many years; a brand new spacious entrance. This new space was carefully and thoughtfully designed. It includes an office space that allows for parents or staff to sit comfortably with the Director, making these interactions more inviting. There is also a locker room as well as plenty of room for families coming and going. One of our main goals with this addition was to increase accessibility in our facility. As an added bonus, the new addition has also provided more play space for the children upstairs which they cheerfully approve of!

I would like to extend my sincere gratitude to the staff and the families for the commitment and understanding for everything we all had to go through over this past year. It was a true testament of how we can all overcome anything and work together in spite of a pandemic and still continue to provide the best quality care for our future leaders.

CULTURAL CONNECTIONS FOR KIDS

Thank you to the Sask Knights of Columbus & Rotary Club of Regina

The Cultural Connection for Kids Program (CCK) is designed for children 3 years of age and up. This program was implemented in 2017 after gathering extensive information from parents and children that were accessing our child care services. With the information gathered, we were able to determine that there was a need in our centres for Indigenous focused programming not only for the children but for the families as a whole.

This value added program ensures that each family receives a new cultural opportunity when they are enrolled at our child care centres. It is designed to help children to connect with their culture by teaching and delivering programming that is reflective of the Indigenous culture. We engage with Knowledge Keepers from the Community as well as Elders to teach Cree language and legends.

Our Himama app is provided to each family as they enroll and helps us stay engaged and connected with our families. This has proven to be a great way to communicate and share individual or group progress of the day to day learning in the CCK program.

We would like to thank the funders for the support as it allows us the opportunity to provide a richer early childhood experience for the children and families that participate. A big thanks to Ann Perry, our Executive Director and our Board of Directors for holding this program close to their hearts and always providing the guidance and support for this important cultural program.



SPECIAL EVENTS AND ACTIVITIES

Over the years, Circle Project has had the pleasure of hosting and celebrating many special events. Through our mission and philosophy we understand the importance of these endeavors. For us, this means to serve, to be present and to be involved in the community. In spite of the new realities we are facing due to the COVID-19 pandemic and the unexpected challenges that this has created in our daily operations, we continued to promote the benefits of working together, especially through the hard times. Our work shifted from a focus on programming, events and education to activities that help secure basic human needs. Because of COVID there were many things that we could not do... however there were some things that we knew we had to do.

In the spring of 2020 we were very concerned about our Indigenous Elders. For the over 100 Elders on our Elders list, we contacted each and every one of them by phone because we knew that the pandemic was leaving them alone and lonely, much like they probably felt as children in Residential School. Something as simple as a phone call and a chat was enough to lift their spirits. To provide further support we secured a special grant from the United Way to fill our Elder's comfort bags with hand sanitizer, cleaning supplies, a few fun activities to help pass the time, a cloth mask donated by Dean Renwick Design Studio and of course some treats. The bags were delivered by Circle Project staff and were greatly appreciated by the Elders.

Something unexpected that came up after this was that some of the Elders started calling in about once a month to check in with us, to say hello and let us know how they are doing. This has become an incredibly important lifeline to our vulnerable Elders.

Considering the overwhelmingly positive response from our Elders we did the same thing for Christmas with the help of Mosaic Potash (phone call, Christmas bag, blanket, gift card and treats) Please read the quotes on this page to see what our Elders had to say.

With the support of Unifor Local 1-S, this Christmas we gifted the children at our daycare centres goody bags and gifts for them and their siblings. Each family also received a turkey and a box of oranges. Our children received some extra

Service Milestones



Of the active participants in Circle Project programming this year, 82% have identified as Indigenous.

Of these participants, 75% stated they were either survivors or intergenerational survivors of Residential Schools. In the case of our children's services the number rises to almost 80%.

2020/2021 FINANCIAL INFORMATION

MANAGEMENT DISCUSSION & ANALYSIS

GENERAL OVERVIEW

This year was a difficult one in many areas and trying in many ways. In a year like no other, navigating the organization and managing risks through changes that occurred due to COVID was a challenge. Coupled with the demands of the construction and renovation of the Circle Project Community and Cultural Hub, which proceeded in spite of the pandemic, the organization dealt with a far more complicated and complex set of problems to solve and issues to address. In spite of uncertainty and challenges that 2020/21 presented, the Circle Project successfully managed it's financial affairs and displaying a high level of accountability and transparency in the day to day operations and in the ongoing stewardship of the organization. The ongoing best practices of setting aside reasonable reserves assisted the Circle Project to successfully maneuver through the significant challenges presented throughout the year. Reserves were augmented by federal funds that were made available to charities and non-profits during the year. The Circle Project is well positioned to engage in continued growth and partnership development in the upcoming year.


ASSETS & LIABILITIES

Capital assets increased again this year. The capital renovations at the two childcare centers contributed to the increase. However, the largest increase in capital assets was due to construction and renovation of the building on 5th Avenue and Elphinstone St. - the future home of the Circle Project Community and Cultural Hub. The Capital Fund showed an increase while the Restricted Reserve Fund almost doubled in size from the previous year. This was largely due to the availability of additional federal funds and special grants. Cash balances also increased significantly due to resources secured through sponsorships and grants to support the construction of the Hub. Special one-time grants to help the childcare centers through the challenges of the pandemic contributed to the unexpected and dramatic increases in cash balances. The movements in assets are consistent with the activities conducted and reflect the changes that occurred throughout the year. The long term debt decreased as monthly payments for the Infant & Toddler Centre mortgage included principal payments to reduce the overall debt. Changes in cash were consistent with financial activities in the year.


REVENUE & EXPENDITURE

In the 2020/21 fiscal year there was a 25% increase in revenues which contributed to the increased cash balances held by the Circle Project in both restricted and unrestricted funds. Hardest hit by the pandemic was the revenues at both childcare centers as enrollments dropped dramatically. At the same time and due to the impacts of COVID, the expenditures for the year dropped by 11% resulting in a significant surplus at year end. The pandemic has affected charities and non-profit organizations across the country in a variety of ways including producing unusual and unexpected financial implications both positive and negative.
